February 5, 10:00 a.m. Update on the Hmong Community in the Twin Cities and Beyond

Hybrid Service (In person & on Zoom)

Presenter: Txongpao Lee Moderator: Leticia Smith



As of the 2000 U.S. Census, the largest Hmong population by metropolitan area resided in and around Minneapolis-St. Paul, with 40,707 people. Minnesota had the

largest percentage in the country at 1.2 %. Like other Asian American ethnic groups, the Hmong population in this country has a varied background, some having arrived as refugees at the end of the Americansponsored war in Vietnam, others as family members of those already settled in this country, and a growing percentage is American born. While there are many who have succeeded in business, the professions

and politics, serious challenges to achieving the American dream still exist for them. Those challenges and strategies to deal with them will be explored in this presentation. We will learn about the role that the Hmong Cultural Center plays in the Hmong community and share ideas on how individuals and organized groups can help in successfully meeting those challenges.

It took nine years for Txongpao Lee to make his way from Laos to Minnesota. Since then, he has been the executive director of the Hmong Cultural Center on University Avenue in St. Paul for 20 years. In this role he has led the center's Hmong 101 program in which he has shared with thousands of Minnesotans the culture, history and contributions Hmong Americans make to the United States. Txongpao also serves as a cultural resource for social workers, teachers, lawyers, criminal justice officials and health care professionals who are working with Hmong clients.

An advocate and teacher for immigrant and refugee clients since the mid-1990s, Txongpao has also helped thousands of Hmong and other immigrants and refugees earn their U.S. Citizenship. For example, in 2021 the Cultural Center's storefront museum was vandalized with racist White Supremacist graffiti, an incident receiving broad media coverage. As a result of Txongpao's courageous leadership, the Twin Cities community responded to this disturbing vandalism incident with more than \$30,000 in museum support.

In this presentation, you will learn some basic principles of Nonviolent Communicaton (NVC) that will help you tend to your own fears, maintain integrity, and still be able to open your heart to friends and family

members who see the world very differently than you do. It does take some work and practice, though.

Here are some questions for which Pam will suggest coping strategies:

- 1 Have you given up staying connected to those whose views seem dangerous to you?
 2 Do you sometimes nod your head in order to get along, but feel bad about doing
- 3 Do you sometimes feel you MUST set others straight, even though you know they won't believe you?
- 4 Do you find that "agreeing to disagree" leaves a wall between you?

Believe it or not, it IS possible to stay in compassionate connection without betraying your own integrity.

Pam Winthrop Lauer is a spiritual director and Certified Trainer with the Center for Nonviolent Communication (cnvc.org), based in St. Paul, Minn. Pam has been practicing NVC since 2006, and doing NVC training, mediation and coaching since 2016. For Pam, NVC is a practical "how-to" practice for living with an open heart. Esch also does stand-up comedy, from time to time, in the spirit of Fr. Guido Sarducci, as Fr. Vito Incognito.
