Michelle Horovitz is a co-founder and now Vice-President of Innovation at Appetite for Change (AFC), a nonprofit social enterprise organization dedicated to using food as a tool to build health, wealth and social change.

Michelle graduated from the University of Pennsylvania with a B.A. in Bioethics and Spanish and earned a J.D. from the University of Minnesota Law School. She worked as an Assistant Public Defender in Miami-Dade County before working for James Beard Award winning Chef Michelle Bernstein.

After returning to Minneapolis, she cofounded Appetite for Change. She is a dedicated leader, passionate about social and racial justice, and advocates for criminal justice reform, and equity. Michelle enjoys yoga, biking and spending time with her family and friends. She lives in Minneapolis with her husband and two children.

writer, and coach based in Minneapolis, Minnesota. He is the author of *The Rise and Fall of Faith* and *Your Next Life Now.* After starting an award-winning interfaith ministry at the age of 16, Drew went on to earn two theological degrees and pastored two Evangelical Christian churches in the Chicago area. After leaving the pastorate and becoming an atheist, he served as president

of The Clergy Project, a nonprofit providing peer support, community resourcing, and career transition assistance to de-converted religious leaders in more than 35 countries around the world.

Drew has a Master of Divinity degree from Moody Theological Seminary, a Bachelor of Arts in pastoral studies from Moody Bible Institute, personal and business coaching certificates from Life Purpose Institute, and a Humanist Celebrant endorsement from The Humanist Society. He is a member of the American Humanist Association, Freedom From Religion Foundation, Unitarian-Universalist Association, and The Loft Literary Center, among others. Drew and his two teenage daughters live in Minneapolis, Minnesota.

Dr. Jeffrey Nelson will speak to us about how he dealt with the serious and often controversial topics of abortion, religious freedom, and other difficult decisions with his patients. He will also share his views on what society needs to do to provide healthier

and safer choices for women.



Dr. Nelson was a family physician who served the Cottage Grove, Minnesota area for over 38 years, retiring in 2020. His professional career saw many

changes, including the transformation from small independent clinics to our current large health systems. A constant theme for each patient was having a personal connection with a physician to handle what are often difficult decisions when it comes to healthcare. How to handle an unintended pregnancy was sometimes one of the most difficult of those decisions.

Dr. Nelson is the author of two books: *I Got to Live with An Angel*, the story of his wife who was diagnosed with brain cancer in 2014 and died in 2016. His second book, *What Should I Do?* speaks to the topic for today.

From 2016 to 2021, she was Dean of the Graduate School of Education and Professor at the University of California at Berkeley.
