March 3, 10:00 a.m. Hybrid (In-person at Mano a Mano, or on Zoom from home) Topic: Post-pandemic future of our small congregations: innovative approaches, continuing issues, and UUA's partnership role Presenter: Rev. Phillip Lund Moderator: Leticia Smith

The COVID pandemic exacerbated some issues and brought new ones still being faced by small UU congregations. Some of these congregations have developed creative strategies they have found effective in the areas of communication, member participation, technology, security, finances and other issues. The UUA has been a partner of these small congregations with its staff and resources. Rev. Lund will expand on these continuing issues and strategies that small congregations have found effective and discuss available resources for small congregations like ours.

Rev. Lund has twenty years of experience serving congregations in the areas of faith formation and spiritual growth. He is a congregational life consultant working for the MidAmerica Region of the UUA. In 2013 Rev. Lund was named the Fahs Fellow for Innovation in Technology by the Fahs Collaborative at Meadville Lombard Theological School.

Rev. Lund currently lives in Saint Paul with his wife Julie and their son Henry David.

Topic: Advocacy and Organizing by Interfaith Coalition on Immigration (ICOM) **Presenters:** Greg King and Sara Adams **Moderator:** Lois Hamilton

Our presenters will acquaint us with the work of the Minnesota Interfaith Coalition in the areas of advocacy, organizing, and support for immigrants and their families. They will also discuss how ICOM does its work to resist detention and deportation of our newest neighbors, and to make sure Minnesota is a welcoming place for them.

Greg King joined the board of ICOM around the time it became a 501(c)(3) nonprofit in 2019 and has served as president of the board since 2021. The son of a Filipina immigrant, Greg got involved in immigrant rights advocacy after the 2016 election, co-founding Filipinx for Immigrant Rights and Racial Justice Minnesota (FIRM) and became involved with ICOM through his congregation St. Joan of Arc Catholic Community. Greg was born in Minneapolis and lives there today with his wife and three daughters.

Sara Adams is the Asylees, Immigrants and Detainees (AID) Coordinator for ICOM. AID is the ICOM accompaniment program that provides financial and emotional support to

immigrants who struggle to obtain even basic resources. Sara is a long-time resident of south Minneapolis and has two sons.

March 17, 10:00 a.m. Online (TED Talk - Zoom from home only) Topic: Atheism 2.0. What aspects of religion should atheists (respectfully) adopt? Presenter: Alain de Botton Moderator: Larry Herbison

Alain de Botton suggests a "religion for atheists" – call it Atheism 2.0 – that incorporates religious format and traditions to satisfy our human need for connection, ritual and transcendence.

Alain de Botton has written seven non-fiction books, the most well-known of which are *How Proust Can Change Your Life* and *Consolations of Philosophy*. He has also made a number of TV documentaries and recently helped found The School of Life (<u>www.theschooloflife.com</u>) and an architectural organization (<u>www.living-</u> <u>schooloflife.com</u>). In 2009, Alain did a TED Global talk in Oxford, saying "It changed my

life, bringing me into contact with so many valuable and interesting people."

Michael James Dorer died on February 6. He was 76 years old. Michael was born in Minneapolis, MN. He is survived by his wife Rose, children Jacob, Benjamin and Margaret; grandchildren Sylvia, Elliott, Simon and Casper; and his faithful black lab Whisper.

Michael had a degree in education, a Montessori certification, received his Master's from St. Mary's in Winona, and his doctorate from Argosy University, Twin Cities. He and his family lived in St. Paul's St.

Anthony Park neighborhood for more than 30 years.

Michael spent his career as a Montessori educator of both children and adults, He trained countless Montessori teachers and consulted numerous school and Montessori programs throughout the world. He served as president of the American Montessori Society, was a senior consultant with the Montessori Foundation and published several Montessori textbooks.

He was a devoted husband and grandfather and a passionate educator. He will be missed by family, friends and educators worldwide.
